

## 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter – Week 2

### The Plagues Continue – Passover Instituted – Israel Leaves Egypt

<p><b>Day 1</b> <b>Exodus 9</b></p> <p>Use Overview of Exodus.</p> <p>Note the chart identifying the Egyptian gods represented by the plagues</p>	<p><b>Key Thoughts:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• The first four plagues caused personal irritation. Now with the fifth plague God causes the loss of personal property, livestock. Once again, Israel is not impacted by the plagues (9:1-7).</li><li>• The sixth plague comes unannounced as Moses tosses ashes into the air which spreads a disease of boils upon all the Egyptians. The Lord hardened Pharaoh's heart (9:8-12).</li><li>• A specific warning is given before the seventh plague. The warning emphasizes Jehovah is the One, True God and He is the All-Powerful God (9:12-21).</li><li>• Hail and fire rains down on Egypt destroying crops. Pharaoh's livestock are killed because he refused to heed the warning (9:22-26).</li><li>• Pharaoh reacts by calling for Moses and Aaron. He says he will let the people go but as soon as the plague ends he hardens his heart and sins more (9:27-35).</li></ul> <p><b>Jesus Christ:</b> The separation of the plague between Israel and Egypt represent Christ separating and protecting His people.</p>
<p><b>Day 2</b> <b>Exodus 10</b></p>	<p><b>Key Thoughts:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• God warns Pharaoh of the plague of locusts. Pharaoh attempts a compromise deal. The eighth plague strikes covering the land with locusts (10:1-15).</li><li>• Pharaoh confesses his sin, ending the plague of the locusts, but the Lord hardens his heart again (10:16-20).</li><li>• The ninth plague brings darkness for three days in Egypt except for the Israelites. Pharaoh offers another proposal which Moses rejects. Pharaoh threatens to kill Moses (10:21-29).</li></ul> <p><b>Jesus Christ:</b> Jesus is the light of the world and those who know Him walk in the light.</p>
<p><b>Day 3</b> <b>Exodus 11</b></p>	<p><b>Key Thoughts:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Moses is told the last plague is prepared. The people of Israel were to ask the Egyptians for articles of silver and gold. The Egyptian people cooperate fulfilling a promise made at the burning bush (11:1-3).</li><li>• Moses announces the tenth plague. God will strike down the firstborn of every family in Egypt (11:4-8).</li><li>• God tells Moses that Pharaoh will not listen in order for the wonders of God to be seen in Egypt. The Lord hardened Pharaoh's heart, once again (11:9-10).</li></ul> <p><b>Jesus Christ:</b> The tenth judgment opens the door to the Passover lamb. Only Jesus will be the sacrifice that can take away our sin.</p>

<p><b>Day 4</b> <b>Exodus 12</b></p>	<p><b>Key Thoughts:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Instructions for the first Passover are given. The instructions include selection of the lamb, how to sacrifice the lamb, the application of the blood and the meal (12:1-13).</li> <li>• The institution of the feast of the unleavened bread is established. It will be a memorial practice annually (12:14-20).</li> <li>• Moses instructs the elders of Israel to prepare for the Passover. The tenth plague then strikes killing the firstborn throughout Egypt (12:21-28).</li> <li>• Pharaoh urges the Israelites to leave, and they leave with great spoils and wealth (12:30-36).</li> <li>• The Lord gives regulations for the practice of the Passover (12:43-51).</li> </ul> <p><b>Jesus Christ:</b> None of the lambs bones were to be broken which is a prophetic picture of Jesus Christ not having any bones broken on the cross.</p>
<p><b>Day 5</b> <b>Exodus 13</b></p>	<p><b>Key Thoughts:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• After over four hundred years the people of Israel are free. God commands Moses to consecrate all firstborn sons and beasts as His own (13:1-2).</li> <li>• Moses sets up a seven-day commemoration of the exodus with The Feast of Unleavened Bread. The feast would be observed annually (13:3-10).</li> <li>• Specific instructions for setting apart firstborn animals and redeeming firstborn sons are given. The purpose is to remember and teach future generations of what God has done for Israel (13:11-16).</li> <li>• God guides the people of Israel with a pillar of cloud in the day and a pillar of fire by night. God leads them by the Red Sea and Moses brings the bones of Joseph as promised (13:17-22).</li> </ul> <p><b>Jesus Christ:</b> In the Bible, leaven symbolizes sin. Jesus is the unleavened bread as the one without sin.</p>
<p><b>Day 6</b> <b>Exodus 14</b></p>	<p><b>Key Thoughts:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• God instructs Moses to have Israel camp by the Red Sea trapping them between the sea and Pharaoh's army. It is actually a trap for Pharaoh (14:1-4).</li> <li>• Pharaoh regrets releasing his slaves and pursues the Israelites with six hundred of his best chariots and his army (14:5-9).</li> <li>• The people of Israel are frightened upon seeing the approaching army and blame Moses for their predicament (14:10-12).</li> <li>• Moses tells the people to have no fear because God is with them. Moses lifts his rod and the Red Sea parts, the pillar of fire and cloud lightens the way for Israel and darkens the way for the Egyptians. The Israelites cross safely but then the army of Pharaoh attempts to cross and God brings down the walls of the water to destroy them. All of Israel fears the Lord (14:13-31).</li> </ul> <p><b>Jesus Christ:</b> The parting of the Red Sea symbolizes Jesus parting the way for His people to pass from death into life.</p>
